We call it the Strategy.

The Strategy is for:



people with disability



• the Australian community.

Our Targeted Action Plans explain what governments will do to help reach the goals in the Strategy.



In this document, we call them action plans.



The action plans are for:




- the Australian Government
- state and territory governments.



Each government has their own actions under each of the action plans.

This means some governments have more actions than others.



In this document, we explain what governments did for each of the action plans between 1 July 2023 and 30 June 2024.

# Our 5 action plans

There are 5 action plans:



1. Working and earning money



2. Community attitudes



3. Early childhood



4. Safety



5. Managing emergencies

# What governments did in 12 months



On 1 July 2023, there were **273** actions left to do across all 5 action plans.

In 12 months, governments:



 finished 138 of actions that were left to do



• are still working on 127 of these actions



• stopped working on 8 of these actions.

# What governments did for each action plan

# Working and earning money

We want people with disability to have the chance to have a job and enough money so they can:



live well



• plan for their future



• have choice and control over their lives.



Our 'Working and earning money' action plan has 2 goals.



 Support people with disability to find and keep jobs.



2. Make it easier for young people with disability when they leave school to get ready to work.

### What governments did in 12 months



There were **56** actions to do.

Governments have done 27 actions.



They are still working on 28 actions.



They stopped working on 1 action.



Governments will do the work of this

1 action through other projects.

#### **Community attitudes**



Your **attitudes** are what you:

- think
- feel
- believe.



We want the community to have positive attitudes towards people with disability.



We want the community to treat people with disability as equals.

We want community attitudes to be inclusive.



When the community is inclusive, everyone can:

- take part
- feel like they belong.



Our 'Community attitudes' action plan has 4 goals.



**1. Employers** understand that people with disability are good workers.

Employers are people who hire other people to work for them.



2. The services and businesses that people use know the right ways to support people with disability.



**3.** More people with disability can be leaders.



**4.** The whole community has positive attitudes towards people with disability.

#### What governments did in 12 months




There were 43 actions to do.

Governments have done 26 actions.



They are still working on 17 actions.

### **Early childhood**



Early childhood includes children from when they are a baby until they can go to school.



We want young children with disability to get what they need from:

- school
- learning
- training.



We want people with disability to:

- learn
- develop their skills.



This will help them:

- be who they want to be
- live the life they want to live.



Our 'Early childhood' action plan has 3 goals.



**1.** Help young children with disability get the support they need during early childhood.



2. Help services support parents and carers to make choices about young children with disability.



**3.** Give parents, carers and young children with disability more chances to connect with others.

#### What governments did in 12 months



There were **54** actions to do.

Governments have done 30 actions.



They are still working on 19 actions.



They stopped working on **5** actions.



Governments will do some of this work through other projects.

### Safety

We want:



• people with disability to feel safe



 the community to treat people with disability the same as everyone else.



We also want the community to support and protect the **rights** of people with disability.



Rights are rules about how people must treat you:

- fairly
- equally.



Our 'Safety' action plan has 5 goals.



**1.** We will get better at knowing if a person with disability is at risk of harm.



- **2.** The services in our community know how to keep people with disability safe, including:
  - community services
  - services everyone can use
  - services for people with disability.



**3.** Government services become better at supporting people with disability at risk of harm.





- use less restrictive practices
- stop using restrictive practices.

Restrictive practices are actions that stop people from moving and doing what they want.



- **5.** We will help people with disability get better at knowing:
  - when they are at risk of harm
  - who they can tell
  - what they can do to stay safe.

#### What governments did in 12 months



There were 83 actions to do.

Governments have done 37 actions.



They are still working on 44 actions.



They stopped working on 2 actions.



Governments will do the work of these

2 actions through other projects.

#### **Managing emergencies**



We want people with disability to be safe and cared for when **emergencies** happen.

Emergencies are dangerous situations that no one expects to happen.



Our 'Managing emergencies' action plan has 2 goals.



- **1.** Include more people with disability when we:
  - look at risks
  - plan for emergencies.



**2.** Support the health of people with disability when emergencies happen.

This includes before, during and after emergencies.

#### What governments did in 12 months




There were **37** actions to do.

Governments have done 18 actions.



They are still working on 19 actions.

# About our new action plans



Governments worked together to make new action plans for 2024 to 2027.


